Cup Final Welcome

For the fourth year in a row Sussex Sharks have reached The Primary Club Cup Final & for the first time since 2022 they aren't playing the 2024 champions Northamptonshire, instead it's a repeat of the 2022 final against Metro.

2025 has seen fewer matches rained off than in any previous season, yet the cup was severely rain effected as it took three attempts to complete the Somerset v Metro quarter final and Metro only won their semi final on 16th August.

Both of today's finalists have already qualified for Twenty20 Cup Finals Day but their league fortunes have differed significantly. Whilst Sussex have dominated National League Division One to claim the title by a wide margin Metro needed a favour from the Sharks to avoid relegation, had Sussex not beaten Somerset in their final game of the season the Londoners would have lost their record as the only team to have never been relegated to Division Two.

Despite their league struggles Metro have been superb in the cup this season. They dismissed Somerset for the lowest score in blind cricket history, 14 all out, in the quarter finals before thrashing 2024 cup winners Northamptonshire in the semi finals. Sussex received a quarter final bye when Surrey were unable to field a side but then edged through an epic semi final versus Lancashire when they hit the winning runs from the very last ball of the match.

We would like to thank Tom Belcher, Gary Wallis-Taylor & the whole team at Sussex Cricket for allowing us to once again hold our cup final at this excellent venue, it's a highlight of our season for our players to get the experience of playing at such an impressive ground.



Good luck to everyone involved,

Northants Stun Sussex For Dramatic Cup Win

On a mild but blustery afternoon at The Northamptonshire County Cricket Ground Northamptonshire Steelbacks ended Sussex Sharks all conquering run that saw them holding all three National trophies at once, as the Steelbacks added to their 2021 BCEW Primary Club Heindrich Swanepoel Cup success at the same ground.

After Northants won the toss & sent Sharks in to bat nobody could have foreseen what happened in the first few overs. Mark Bond fell caught behind off Mike Harrison's bowling from the very first ball of the match & Dave Daniels followed in the second over after David Howells caught him from Asif Ali's bowling.

Sussex's captain Dan Field followed them back to the pavilion when

Mark Turnham took an excellent catch to give Conna Burrows his first cup final wicket. Adam Solan (who finished with 2-47) then proceeded to stamp his mark on his first cup final, he bowled both Toby Collins & Ian Morris to leave Sussex in massive trouble at 37/5.

Si Ledwith (61) & Callum Weir (29 not out) then showed some fight & patiently rebuilt the innings, they scored steadily & nudged the run rate over five an over before Si was eventually dismissed from the 74th ball he faced caught by David Howells for Mike Harrison's second wicket, Mike ended with 2-27. Callum continued for the rest of the innings but wickets continued to fall at the other end with David Howells catching both Marcus Kipling & Phil Daniels with Mark Turnham

& Conna Burrows (2-19) claiming their wickets. Bilal Akhtar also bowled a good but wicketless spell whilst Ryley Day-Hector, Shavaun Richardson & Tokeer Akhtar all made significant contributions to a superb fielding effort that restricted Sussex to 163/8.

Northants reply started with a first over wicket as Phil Daniels bowled Mike Harrison. Gerald Porter & Adam Solan steadied the ship until Adam was caught by Si Ledwith off Dave Daniels bowling to make it 42/2. However by this time Phil Daniels had been forced to leave the field with a torn calf, reducing the Sharks bowling options.

In the next few overs Gerald Porter & David Howells batted with patience, they gradually upped the scoring rate & the longer their partnership continued the further ahead Northants got. Gerald, who finished 54 not out, reached his fifty first before David followed.

After 20 overs Northants only needed 24 more to win, David Howells then thrashed two sixes & 3 fours from the 21st over to bring proceedings to an early conclusion as Northants sealed the win with 8 wickets & 9 overs to spare.

This was only Northants second Primary Club Cup win & fourth major trophy overall, it also kept up the record that when the same teams have met in successive Primary Club Cup Finals the trophy has always changed hands.

For four catches along with his brutal 82 not out from 49 balls David Howells was named Partially Sighted Man of the Match whilst Adam Solan was Totally Blind Man of the Match thanks to his two wickets.

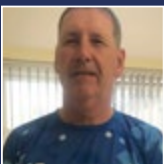

BCEW Primary Club Heindrich Swanepoel Cup 2025

Quarter Finals

Lancashire Lions (292/5) beat Kent Spitfires (101 All Out) by 191 runs. Lancashire put together a challenging total thanks to Tahseen Sabir (99), Shahzaib Haider (83) & Mahmood Zahid (68). Luke Boulding was pick of the bowlers with 2-35 whilst Javid Patel was Kent's most economical bowler.

Tom Barton top scored with 32 as Kent never looked like chasing down the Lions score, Sheraz Chohan (3-24) and Salman Shiekh (2-1) were the most successful bowlers.

Sussex Sharks beat Surrey VICC via concession when Surrey were unable to field a team.

London Metro (399/2) beat Somerset VICC (14 All Out) by 385 runs. A record breaking day started with Metro wracking up a huge score thanks to centuries from Matt Dean (134) & Nick Ebbeck (135), Thomas Froud (46 not out) & Mo

Ghalib (24 not out) also made fast contributions.

It was however in the second innings that a pair of records fell. An under strength Somerset side collapsed to 14 All Out, the lowest score ever recorded in blind cricket in this country, breaking a record that had stood since the mid 1980's. The architect of that collapse was Mo Ghalib who claimed all eight Somerset wickets conceding just a single run in the process. Mo's 8-1 overtakes Luke Sugg's 8-26 as the best bowling figures ever recorded in blind cricket in the UK.

Northamptonshire Steelbacks (186/2) beat Yorkshire Vikings (185/4) by 8 wickets. Bashaarat Mohammed batted through Yorkshire's innings before finally being run out for 96 from the final ball, but tight bowling from Bilal Akhtar & Conna Burrows, as well as from brothers Asif & Hassan Ali meant that the Vikings could only reach 185 at the end of their overs.

After an early wicket Bilal Akhtar (78 not out) & Hassan Ali (54) took the Steelbacks to the edge of a victory sealed by a rapid 15 not out from Asif Ali, Northamptonshire completed the chase with 13.2 overs to spare.

Semi Finals

Sussex Sharks (307/6) beat Lancashire Lions (305/5) by 4 wickets

It's no exaggeration to say that there have been few better games than this one in the competitions 46 year history. A spectacular 167 from 79 balls from Lancashire opener Shahzaib Haider set the Lions on the way to a huge total, he received able support from Shah Miah who finished 59 not out.

Mark Bond got the Sharks off to a solid start with 62 at nearly a run a ball before Dan Field blasted 169 from 94 balls. As the game closed in on a nail biting finish fast knocks of 13 from Phil Daniels & 11 from Marcus Kipling took it to the final ball. Sussex were level with Lancashire's score but had lost one more wicket so had to score off

the final delivery. Making his Sharks debut Paul Littlefield managed to get the ball away & a well run two sparked celebrations for the men from the south coast.

London Metro (338/2) beat Northamptonshire Steelbacks (149 All Out) by 189 runs

A truly dominant Metro batting performance ended this tie by the lunch break. Nick Ebbeck shared a 109 run opening partnership with Matt Dean before falling for 23 as the first of two wickets in three balls for Conna Burrows. That was as good as it got for Northamptonshire however as the Londoners third wicket pair put on an unbeaten 228. Matt Dean finished his phenomenal innings on 202 not out whilst teenager Thomas Froud made his highest national level score of 75 not out.

A brutal 79 from David Howells gave the Steelbacks a glimmer of hope but in truth they fell well short as Mo Ghalib took another 4 wickets and Rob Mackenzie claimed 3-10.

Sussex Pay Tribute to Mark Burchell

It is with great regret that Sussex Sharks Visually Impaired CC must advise of the death of Mark “Big Bad” Burchell.

Known to all as Burch, Burchie or “big bad”, Mark made his debut for the sharks in 2004 in a game away to RNC. His first act was with the bat, driving the first ball he received back over the bowler’s head for 6. In his modest and understated way it was a game or two before he ventured “I can bowl a bit”. Thus began his career which would see him known as one of the most fearsome bowlers of a generation. If you didn’t have the privilege of seeing him bowl he generated incredible bounce as well as sharp pace, which many found too hot to handle.

His best game for the Sharks was probably the 2014 Cup Final against Somerset. With the Sharks reeling at 7 down for 124, Burch came in at number 9 and shared a 53 run partnership to haul us up to a competitive total of 193. He then took 2 wickets for 18 runs. Knocking over 2 of Somerset’s top 4 batsmen and restricting their scoring, which would ultimately win us the game. He made 81 appearances between 2004 and 2015 claiming 96 wickets and scoring just over 300 runs scored in many cameos towards the end of an innings.

Anyone who knew Mark might have been confused as to how he had been given the monicker of “big bad”. Whilst he was certainly big at 6ft 4 and “sturdy”, he was one of the nicest men you will ever meet. The origin of the name was a training session where A young lad aged about 14 had turned up to try the game and Mark managed to hit him on the head and upper body 3 or 4 times. Just his natural bounce but of course we were never going to let that get in the way. The young lad then had a bowl at Burch who promptly belted him absolute miles... and then made the lad go and get the ball stating that “his legs are younger than mine and look at him run, he is loving it” and thus the “big bad” legend was born.

Even back in 2004, Burch explained he had “had a touch of colon cancer, but am ok now”. Sadly the big C continued to stalk him and at one point he joked with me “I probably have fewer organs left than they have had to take out but I feel fine in myself”. Despite being forced to retire Mark was forever a Shark and we spoke with him after most games with

us giving him the blow by blow account of the game and of course any related tomfoolery that never made any formal match report. Wonderfully Mark was able to join us back in May 2024 at the Sussex County Ground to watch the Cup Final. Whilst physically a shadow of his former self, his wit and charm shone through and we were all delighted to have him there to share the day. When I spoke with him after the game he was so touched that he had been made to feel like he had never been away.

Andy Dalby-Welsh, former Sharks captain:-

“Burchy was a great man and a great club man. Sussex through and through.

He was an absolute pleasure to captain during my time, He would always take his joy from other people’s achievements with a real sense of pride for them even when he was facing his incredibly challenging health battles.”

After battling cancer for over 20 years sadly Marks final innings closed on New Years eve forever a Shark and he will be deeply missed.
